Let Me Introduce Myself

I want to thank you all for inviting me to write about myself and the ministry that is going on here at St Paul's Lutheran Church and School in Janesville, Wisconsin. I have only the Lord to thank for bringing me here. He has been preparing me to come to St. Paul's for as long as Pastor Decker has been here. I graduated with a theology degree out of Concordia Chicago in 2015, and then immediately went to the Seminary in St. Louis. While studying there I also served for a year of vicarage up in Green Bay, Wisconsin. I am so thankful to be here, the Spirit is moving and I am glad to be a part of it.

Pastor Decker has already brought me on board for a wide variety of ministries. We are currently working our way into serving the homeless. I am also trying to find ways that we can connect with nonbelievers within our community here in Janesville.

I also am in charge of assimilating new members into the congregation. In order to do this we have developed a class called *Faith in Action* that is designed to teach people how to live out their Christian lives.

I have also been trying to focus on showing how the Biblical message is applicable to everyday life through the Sunday Morning *Route 66* Bible study class.

This ministry would not be possible without your prayers and support. I thank you all for everything that you do. If you have any questions about the ministries going on here at St. Paul's please come and visit me, I would love to hear from you!

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St. Paul's School Continues to Grow

I know that St. Paul's holds a special place for all of you, and we have the opportunity to expand our facility to reach even more families with the message of the Gospel. Through God's grace, we have been growing, and that means we are at the limits of what our building currently can hold. With our needs for more space and our growth in mind, we began a building feasibility study last year to explore the possibility of an expansion that has three parts.

1. A daycare wing built specifically for the needs of a daycare center. This wing would be on the north side of the building, and it would include 6 daycare classrooms and a gymnasium specifically for daycare use. This would be built with the plan of having the daycare center licensed through the state. This new daycare addition also means that we are in search of a Called daycare director to lead us into the future of that program.

2. A school addition of 6 more classrooms and a large common area. This would be above the new daycare wing, and it would allow us to continue to grow and reach more families through our teaching ministry. Those additional classrooms would enable us to reach 225 more students at full capacity than we can currently teach. What a great opportunity! The school portion would also move the main office to a newly built space by the parking lot, and it would add an elevator to the Ringold street entrance that would reach the basement, tunnel, first and second floors.

3. A church addition that includes a larger narthex and a large multi-purpose room. This would provide greater opportunities for fellowship, and also more space for church events and activities during the school day.

Please pray for the church, school, and daycare as we continue this process. We should have the results of our feasibility study by November. Those results will be shared with the congregation, and then it is in God's hands as to what the future of that plan will be.
