Alumni Association News

We are serving alumni from ages 13 to 101. This gives everyone an opportunity to learn something from one another IF everyone shares something about their life. In the last newsletter we reported about the alumni association from St Michael's in Milwaukee, with their school closing in 1969. Their alumni are ages 64 and older. Someone from their Board came to visit and brought a sample newsletter to share. To summarize, they mailed out 870 newsletters and heard back from 125 alumni, with about 75 giving their news items for the next newsletter. Donations totaled \$8000. Their newsletter is produced three times a year, with 8 pages in booklet format. It includes reproductions of many old photos plus news items sent by alumni, including their appreciation for the newsletter, and remembering their past. They have an annual brunch following a Sunday mass in early May.

Given this information, we also are including a form for you to fill out and either mail back or send the information via e-mail. This will save from tracking down people and getting newsletters returned due to the wrong address. If you have family or friends who have moved, please notify us.

Newsletters returned with the wrong address from the last mailing, numbered 106. Of those, all but three alums have been located, plus addresses updated for 30 more that had changed since the last mailing. This takes time, complicated by no phone numbers, not answering the phone, or not replying to phone or email messages. Please keep us updated with changes in your contact information. Need one or two contact persons for classes 1960-2018 to keep up with their classmates.

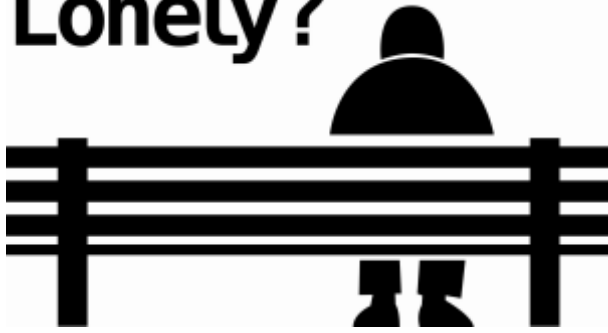

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Lonely?



No One Immune to Loneliness

Loneliness is on the rise in the U.S., and no one is immune. Research published earlier this year found that people 18 to 22 years old were more likely than any other U.S. population to be lonely. But new data suggests that older adults are also lonely in high numbers. More than a third of adults over 45 are lonely, according to a new report from AARP. While the 35% remains unchanged from a 2010 survey, the over-45 population has increased substantially since then, meaning about 5 million more adults, almost 48 million in total, can now be considered lonely.

Earlier this year, the BBC launched a loneliness survey with responses from 55,000 people from around the world. The 16-24 year age group was the loneliest. There is a common stereotype that loneliness mainly strikes older, isolated people—and it can, and does. But the BBC survey found even higher levels of loneliness among younger people, and this pattern was the same in every country. The years between 16 and 24 are often a time of transition where people move from home, build their identities and try to find new friends. The increase in use of technology also is a factor. The survey found that younger people felt more able to tell others about their loneliness than older people, but still many young people felt ashamed about it. Were older people afraid to say how they really felt or had they found a way of coping? When loneliness becomes chronic it can have a serious impact on both health and well-being.

Christian Character Foundation Project

A character education program that works and is rooted in Scripture was developed by Open Sky Education, a Recognized Service Organization of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod.

The Christian Character Formation Project (CCFP) is being adopted by Lutheran schools across the country and around the world.

The seven virtues the curriculum highlights are responsibility, respect, integrity, diligence, justice, self-sacrifice, and courage. Self-discipline, empathy, and humility also enter the picture.





Abortion—Where do you stand?

Where major religious groups and parties stand on abortion:

Oppose abortion rights with few exceptions: Roman Catholic, LCMS, WELS, Southern Baptist, Assemblies of God, LDS/Mormon.

Support abortion rights with some limits: ELCA, Episcopal.

Supports abortion rights with few or no limits: Judaism, Unitarian, Presbyterian (USA), UCC, United Methodist.

In a survey this year, Pew Research found most members follow their church body's official position, except for Roman Catholics, where 53% said it should be legal.

It is also divided among party lines. About two-thirds of Republicans say abortion should be illegal in most cases. By contrast, three-quarters of Democrats say abortion should be legal in all or most cases.

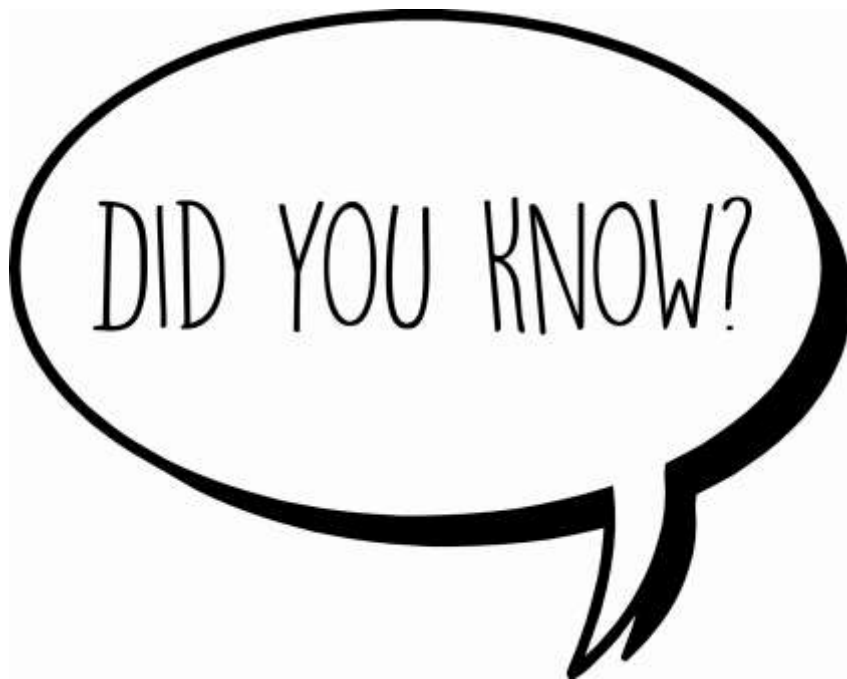


Religious Trends Today

Christians are the largest religious group in the world, but Islam is the fastest growing religion in the world, and in Europe, due to immigration and above average birth rates. Those who do not identify with any organized religion is the fastest growing group in America for all age groups, but is especially prevalent with the young (under age 35), with the highest rate in the New England states. In 7 years, the unaffiliated have increased by over 6 percent, while the number of Christians has dropped by 8 percent, according to Pew Research. Those Americans who identify with non-Christian faiths has risen 1.2 percent. The share of Christians who are Hispanics and minorities has risen.
