What's New?

What's new at St. Paul's? Lots! In the past few years St. Paul's has started a one to one program for the middle school. This means that each student has a laptop that they use in each class. This allows the teachers to do new things they couldn't do before. Things like Quizlet Live, Kahoot, or a digital breakout. Things like video journals and collaborative presentations. It is exciting to see students and teachers engaged in learning in ways that weren't even possible 10 years ago. St. Paul's has also started a computer coding class for students in 5-8th grade. Computer coding is a skill our students will need in the future, just as cursive (which we still teach) is a skill they need to translate the past. That is a big part of what we do; we prepare our students for what comes next while plugging them into what came before.

Our goal amidst all this change has always been to uphold and teach what never changes. What hasn't changed? Lots. We still share the love of Christ and the Gospel message with our students and their families. We still serve our community through mission projects and fundraisers. We still provide a quality education centered on Christ. That is why we have a school. That is why St. Paul's was started. We share Jesus with our community, with our students, with everyone.

St. Paul's school is 153 years old, and we have made it this far because our foundations are sure. While that isn't new for us, the love of Jesus is new for some of our students. Some of them experience Jesus for the first time here, at the school. I can't think of a better reason to continue to do what we do.

Pray that God would bring families to St. Paul's, so we can share the Gospel message with them.

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Hi, St. Paul's School Alumni!

Greetings in the wonderful Name of our once dead but now living Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! May this note find you well blessed.

Our former St. Paul's principal, Dennis Vierk, has asked me to write an article to update you on the ministry of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Since my mother taught me to always pay attention to whatever a principal said to me I am glad to do so.

Eight years ago the Holy Spirit called me as St. Paul's senior pastor. Our church and school had undergone several dramatic changes. Three pastors had all left or retired within the year in 2011. Likewise, the school principal had retired and had been recently replaced with a new principal.

At the time, it was apparent that St. Paul's Church needed to undergo a different staffing model. Instead of two associate pastors, St. Paul's would be served by three Directors of Christian Education (DCE). These DCE's would be able to start ministries that would focus on meeting the spiritual needs of our school children and their families. Our church staff has also been challenged to take their ministries out into the community.

In 2013 we were blessed with DCE intern, later called DCE, John Mueller for youth and children ministries. Needless to say, John immediately bonded with our kids and youth and these ministries continue to grow by leaps and bounds. Through the Lord Jesus using John our youth meet each week at St. Paul's for Bible study and fellowship. John has now expanded his youth ministry by leading Bible studies and fellowship groups in two local high schools. Trips to our national youth gathering, as well as local and national mission trips have come from John's ministry. Please pray for John and his ministry to God's children.

In 2014 we added a full-time DCE position for church and school music. That position is currently filled by Ann Henny. Ann's responsibilities involve teaching classroom music and leading our blended worship services. Ann is in the process of developing a youth praise band. Please pray for Ann as she continues to grow St. Paul's music ministry.

In 2015, one of our faculty members, Kathy Pingel, agreed to leave classroom teaching to head up our family and women's ministry. What a Holy Spirit-led act that was! Our women's and family ministries have simply exploded. Multiple Bible studies, fellowship events, and retreats are regularly being held. Our women's retreat this spring recently wrapped up with over one hundred participants from our church, local churches, and the community. Kathy has been able to add an outward focus to her vibrant ministries through service activities, mission projects, and community donations. Please pray for Kathy and her ministry to St. Paul's school families and young parents.

In 2018 St. Paul's entered into partnership with Lutheran Church Charities to receive a comfort dog named Mary. Mary has been instrumental in bringing the love of Jesus Christ to hundreds of people both inside and outside of St. Paul's church. She has visited hospitals, nursing homes, funeral homes, the homebound, Alzheimer/dementia patients, and recently was present at the funerals of two Illinois State Patrolmen. Wherever Mary goes and whoever she visits she brings a calming presence of concern and love. Please pray for those who handle Mary and help administer this very vital ministry.

Finally, St. Paul's has just received word that we shall receive a graduate of our Concordia Seminary, St. Louis to serve as our associate pastor. The main element of our associate pastor's call will be to serve as a missionary sent to minister to the millennial generation of our Janesville area.

Here are some sobering statistics concerning millennials:

- Only 2 in 10 Americans under 30 believe attending a church is important or worthwhile (an all-time low).
- 59 percent of millennials raised in a church have dropped out.
- 35 percent of millennials have an *anti-church* stance, believing the church does more harm than good.
- Millennials are the least likely age group of anyone to attend church (by far).

Our associate/missionary pastor will develop an extensive ministry to millennials that will include small group Bible studies/fellowships, service events, and an off-site, ultra-contemporary service that is friendly to those who are wary of the Christian church.

Please keep these efforts in your prayers. I would also ask that you would look back at the blessings you received through St. Paul's and then prayerfully consider financially supporting its ministry efforts. Many of you attended St. Paul's School when there was no tuition. At that time St. Paul's Church financially supported the majority of the cost of educating students. While St. Paul's Church still does meet much of the financial cost of educating students, its ability to do so is waning as overall charitable giving in our country has not increased since the 1970's.

Our Lord challenged His Church to seek first God's Kingdom and all the things of life will be added to it. By God's grace, St. Paul's is trying to do just that. Last week two St. Paul's students were baptized into God's Kingdom and this week I have meetings to talk with three families about their children being baptized! Please join your fellow St. Paul's alumni in praising God for St. Paul's ministry. Praise God also for your prayerful support our ministry!

Class of 1968**

St. Paul's church and school has had a rich heritage in educating our young members. My participation in the program was only a short seven years beginning in the second grade from the Fall of 1961 until graduation from eighth grade in 1968. It began at an old school on Academy Street, moved to our new and current building in the Fall of 1963, and served to influence many to pursue Christian education as a career choice - myself included.

Most of my memories at St. Paul's began in the fourth grade when we moved into our new building. One of my earliest school memories in our new school was a brand new intern teacher named Mr. Rogalski. We had a class of 36 kids and I'm sure we were a challenge. One day he had set up a really cool science experience that he called "kick the can", whereby he built up air pressure in a closed can by heating it on a hot plate. As it cooled the air compressed and the can collapsed. The experiment was impressive but the hot plate accidentally burned a hole in the counter of our brand new classroom. To this day there is an insert in the counter where the hole was.

Our next year we had another new teacher named Mr. Dahm for fifth grade. My family home was located through the block on the back side of the school playground. My dad had built us a treehouse thirty feet up in a century old elm tree which was visible from the playground. Mr. Dahm would often tease me about how he wanted to climb up to my tree house. One day I challenged him to come over after school to climb the tree. As he stood looking up from the base of the tree, he had the look of trepidation but he agreed to climb. Once he had ascended to the second crotch of the tree he stopped. Frozen in fear he told me to call the fire department. At 11 years of age, I laughed, thinking he was kidding. Again he told me to call the fire department because he couldn't get down. I managed to coax him down and he never did make it into my tree house.

Mr. Gersmehl was our sixth grade teacher and also the athletic director. The gymnasium was respectfully named after him: The Lienhard (Len) Gersmehl Memorial Gym. Each year our traditional Christmas program was performed on Christmas Eve. We always sang the entire Christmas Cantata. One year the 8th grade was required to stand on the stage for the whole performance. Part way through, several students began to faint and one-by-one, like dominoes, they all fell over.

Other memories included bus rides to basketball games, annual basketball tournament in Freeport, Illinois, confirmation, and graduation.

With more than just these fun memories our school impressed on many students the call to serve future generations as teachers, pastors, school board members, elders, and certainly hundreds of parent volunteers for generations. The work of the Holy Spirit continues to call our youth to serve our Savior and community.


